# LANGUAGE, LANGUAGE!

We want to help in the national effort to preserve native languages. Preserving and protecting native languages is not only crucial for cultural relevance, but also a historical necessity. With many tribes practicing the tradition of oral history, preserving language is key to understanding the past. To help with this, the Jordan Native program, in partnership with the Granite School District, offers Navajo Language classes for high school students. The classes take place at night and are open to any community members. Classes will begin again in January. We also offer self-study options using online classes with Duolingo. Duolingo is an interactive language program that utilizes an online self-study model to build and retain language from actual native speakers. If you would like to learn a language, reach out to Malinda. Currently, only two Indigenous languages are being offered: Navajo and Hawaiian. We will continue to advocate for other languages as the program expands. We have a limited number of memberships left, so act fast!

## **Mentors in New Mexico**

The National Indian Education Association held its 54th annual Convention and Trade Show in Albuquerque, New Mexico last month. The Jordan Native Program sent 3 program members to this four-day conference-the largest gathering of Native American educators, administrators, mentors, and policy advocates. Our team attended a variety of sessions aimed at increasing our program's academic success as well as a 'K'é' approach to whole student wellness. Our team participated in various cultural activities, such as an intertribal PowWow and Gourd Dance, and attended a trade show featuring talented Native American artists. This conference not only provided our program with resources and guidance for our students, but it also inspired our team to continue to grow our program into a culturally rich and influential academic support system for our community. We are excited to take all we learned into the field as we help our students' academic growth.
