NATIONAL NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

November is National Native American Heritage Month (American Indian and Alaska Native Heritage Month). It's a time to celebrate the rich and diverse cultures, traditions, and histories of our Native American community, and to acknowledge our important contributions to the United States. This month is also an opportunity for our program and mentors to educate others about the challenges Native people have faced both historically and in the present, and to continue our program's commitment to supporting the educational needs of our Native students.

Here are some ways the Jordan Native Program has done this:

- Books, books, books. With our programs focused on literacy, we have purchased sets of books for the school libraries across the Jordan School district that are focused on Native culture by Native authors. Lori continues to visit elementary students to give them personal books to take home.
- Support and Attend Local Native Events and Celebrations. Our program team has attended several events with our bracelet-making booth. At these events, we recruit businesses and community members to help provide support and services for our community while we expand our student enrollment.

- Learn About History. We support teaching about the history and culture of the Native tribes who originally inhabited our state.
